Who We Are!



The Africa Programme at the United Nations University for Peace (UPEACE) was established in 2002 with a strong focus on enhancing the capacity of various African stakeholders in the domains of peace, conflict governance, security, and development. This initiative primarily aims to strengthen the capabilities of African regional institutions, universities, research institutes, governments, and civil society organizations.

The programme emphasizes teaching, training, research, and publications, all directed towards fostering sustainable peace and development on the continent. It is part of UPEACE's global network, which includes regional offices in Africa (Addis Ababa, Ethiopia), Europe (Netherlands and Switzerland), Asia (China/South Korea), and Southeast Asia (Manila, Philippines). These regional offices facilitate collaborative work and regional outreach, ensuring that UPEACE's mission and expertise reach global contexts while also emphasizing the specific challenges and opportunities unique to each region.

Through its activities, the Africa Programme focuses on the development of African solutions to African challenges, seeking to engage various stakeholders across the continent in creating more stable, just, and peaceful societies. This engagement includes research on pressing issues such as conflict prevention, governance, human rights, disaster resilience, and humanitarian action. The program also seeks to foster inter-institutional cooperation and strengthen the linkages between academia, policymakers, and practitioners in the peacebuilding field.

With a network of academic partnerships, UPEACE Africa facilitates capacity-building initiatives such as postgraduate education, specialized training, and policy-oriented research, all tailored to the African context. Moreover, the Programme contributes to policy dialogues through conferences, publications, and collaborative research, addressing emerging issues in peace and security, while also contributing to advancing Africa's role in global peace and security initiatives.





UPEACE Africa Director Champions African Peace and Security at T20 Africa High-Level Policy Dialogue

The University for Peace (UPEACE) Africa Programme proudly participated in the recent T20 Africa High-Level Policy Dialogue under the theme "Strengthening African Agency in the G20 within the Emerging Global Order." This timely and strategic gathering brought together a distinguished cohort of African policymakers, think tanks, academics, and global experts to reflect on Africa's priorities and articulate a shared vision for the future.

At the heart of this influential dialogue was the UPEACE Africa Director, who delivered a powerful intervention on "Confronting the Challenges of Peace and Security in Africa in the Emerging Global Order." His presentation focused on the complex dynamics shaping the continent's peace and security landscape and emphasized the need for African-led responses grounded in contextual realities and regional solidarity. With the African Union's recent accession to permanent G20 membership & South Africa's



current G20 presidency, her message resonated strongly with calls for Africa's greater voice in global governance.

The Director's contribution aligned with the broader aims of the dialogue: to amplify African voices, drive robust policy discussions, and develop well-informed, Africa-centric recommendations for the global policy agenda. Core themes included inclusive economic growth, sustainable development, and global governance reforms—all integral to building the African futures we collectively envision.

More than a convening of experts, this dialogue served as a participatory space for strategic planning, innovation, and bold thinking—rooted in African agency and ownership. The UPEACE Africa Director's insights underscored the importance of homegrown solutions and intercontinental collaboration in securing a peaceful, prosperous future for Africa.

UPEACE Africa is honoured to have contributed to this high-level platform and remains committed to advancing Africa's role in shaping global peace, security, and development discourses.





Celebrating Peace builders: UPEACE Africa Graduation Ceremony 2025 Marking World Education Day with Purpose, Diversity, and Impact



On 24 January 2025, the University for Peace – Africa Programme hosted a significant graduation ceremony in Mogadishu, Somalia, coinciding with World Education Day—a powerful moment that underscored our commitment to inclusive, transformative, and equitable education for all. 


Key Areas of Focus: Peace, Security, and Conflict Resolution

UPEACE Africa Programme Launches Upcoming Short Courses and Welcomes New Degree Applications

The University for Peace (UPEACE) Africa Programme is pleased to announce the launch of its 2025 professional short certification programmes, designed to equip aspiring professionals and leaders with essential skills in peace, governance, international relations, and development.

Kicking off on May 5th, 2025, the first course—"United Nations System, Careers, and Engagement Opportunities"—will provide participants with a deep dive into the structure, functions, and pathways to careers within the UN and related international organisations.

Following this, a robust schedule of short certification courses will continue from June through December 2025, covering key topics such as:

- Economic Diplomacy and Global Trade Policies
- Managing NGOs for Social Impact
- Diplomacy and International Negotiation Strategies
- Gender, Peace, and Development
- Human Rights, Humanitarian Law, and International Justice
- Climate Change, Environment, and Conflict

Policy Corner: Trump-Era Policies and Their Ripple Effects on Africa's Economy By Esther Lum Ndutu.N Ph.D Fellow University for Peace Africa Programme.





The return of Donald Trump to office in 2025 ushered in a fresh wave of policy changes that are reshaping Africa's economic landscape. Among the most impactful has been the reintroduction of steep reciprocal trade tariffs—up to 50%—on exports from 22 African countries. This policy, aimed at reducing the U.S. trade deficit, placed unprecedented strain on the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA), which for years enabled many African nations to access the U.S. market duty-free.

Key economies like South Africa, Nigeria, and Kenya have felt the brunt. South Africa's automotive exports now face a 31% tariff, threatening thousands of jobs and weakening their industrial base. Kenya's agricultural products, particularly tea and flowers destined for the U.S. market, have seen declining demand due to higher prices, impacting smallholder farmers and exporters.

Simultaneously, the Trump administration's proposed elimination of the U.S. Bureau of African Affairs & significant cuts to foreign aid programs have diminished American development presence on the continent. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), once a cornerstone of the U.S. health response in Africa, saw major funding reductions, while support for humanitarian programs in Somalia, South Sudan, and the Sahel region was significantly curtailed. These cuts have strained public health systems, education programs, and refugee support initiatives at a time when climate-related crises and conflict are escalating humanitarian needs.

The Trump administration also pushed aggressively for access to Africa's strategic mineral resources—including cobalt, coltan, lithium, and rare earth elements—essential for electric vehicle batteries and advanced electronics. U.S. firms have expanded operations in mineral-rich countries like the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), but critics warn of exploitation risks, lack of transparency, and worsening socio-environmental impacts in already fragile regions.

Compounding these challenges is the broader economic uncertainty fueled by the "America First" doctrine. Trade tensions with China disrupted global supply chains and slowed foreign direct investment into African economies. Nigeria, reliant on oil exports, experienced a dramatic slump in revenues following global oil price fluctuations, while South Africa saw reduced capital inflows, a weakening rand, and investor caution amid U.S. policy unpredictability.

In response, African nations are proactively strengthening economic self-reliance and diversifying partnerships. The African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), launched in 2021, is gaining momentum as countries work to reduce internal trade barriers & increase value-added production. Kenya and Nigeria, among others, are ramping up bilateral cooperation with China & the European Union, targeting infrastructure, renewable energy, and digital technology sectors as key growth areas.

While Trump's policies have exposed the vulnerabilities of Africa's economic dependence on Western powers, they have also accelerated a long-needed pivot toward regional integration and south-south cooperation. As Africa positions itself for a more assertive role in the global economy, strategic autonomy and inclusive development will be critical in ensuring resilience and long-term prosperity.


